
Descriptive Devices

Definitions Tripling – using something three times for effect. R Repetition – using something more than once for effect. A Alliteration -the repetition of the initial letter of each word in words close together M Metaphor- comparing something to something else by say it is that P Personification - Attributing a human quality to a thing or idea S Simile- comparison using 'like' or 'as'



PF Pathetic fallacy – when the weather reflects the mood. Foreshadowing - When the writer hints at things to come C Connotations – associated meanings of a word. J Juxtaposition - two things being seen or placed close together with contrasting effect. SF Semantic field - Words associated in meaning
