This poem describes how precious water is to poor people in a hot climate, where thirst is ever-present and there is dangerous shortage. The 'Blessing' of the title refers to the burst water pipe, and the panicked and near-hysterical reaction of the people who are granted this unexpected gift of gushing water that is difficult to save. The end of the poem is a note of joy and hope in the delight of the children.

Island Man by Grace Nichols

The poem expresses the homesickness immigrants can feel in a new country, while also suggesting that many immigrants keep their home alive within themselves and thus never truly leave it behind.
