A REMINDER ABOUT ROAD SAFETY

SEPTEMBER 2026: IMPORTANT SCHOOL UPDATES

As we prepare to welcome students back in September, we would like to remind you of some important changes that will be introduced across the school. These developments are designed to support learning, improve consistency, and provide the best possible environment for all students.

MOBILE PHONES

From September, all students will be required to hand their mobile phones to their Form Tutor at the start of each school day. Phones will be securely stored throughout the day in lockers and returned to students before they leave the school site.

BEHAVIOUR AND EXPECTATIONS

As part of our continued focus on creating a calm, purposeful and positive learning environment, there will also be some changes to our behaviour procedures from September. If a student receives a C2 consequence, they will be spoken to by their Head of Year outside the classroom. This will result in a breaktime detention. If a student receives a C3 and is removed from a lesson, they will go directly to Reset and will spend a full school day in the Reset room.

These procedures are designed to minimise disruption to learning, ensure consistency across the school, and support all students in meeting our high expectations for behaviour and conduct. By introducing clear and consistent consequences, we aim to create an environment where every student can learn, achieve and thrive.

ONE WEEK TIMETABLE

The school will be moving from a two-week timetable cycle to a one-week timetable. This change will provide greater consistency, making it easier for students to organise themselves and prepare for lessons.

BREAK AND LUNCH ARRANGEMENTS

The daily timetable will now include:

- 20-minute morning break
- 40-minute lunch break

All students will have their break and lunch at the same time.

To support effective movement around the school and ensure suitable spaces are available for everyone, year-group zones will be introduced for both break and lunch. These designated areas will include indoor and outdoor spaces. Further information about these zones will be shared with students when they return in September.

SPORTS HALL

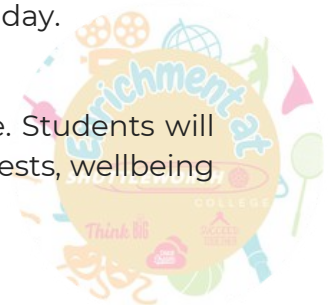
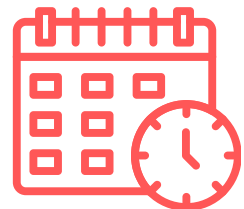
The Sports Hall will no longer be used as a break and lunchtime space. It will return to the PE Department for lessons and curriculum activities throughout the school day.

BARCELONA 2026

Over May half term 55 students went to Barcelona on a sports tour. With the change of transport to flying, from our previous coach journey in recent years, both staff and students were appreciative of the shortened journey time and extra day.

During day 1 we visited Espanyol's stadium, where we received a guided tour around the world famous football stadium. Highlights from the tour included visiting the home team changing rooms, a walk through the tunnel onto the pitch and seeing all the kits and how they have changed over the years. Many students also took advantage of the club shop, buying some important souvenirs for themselves and their families. We spent the afternoon around the hotel pool, enjoying the sun and spending time with friends, before an evening down at the beach playing football or enjoying an ice cream.



Day 2 was waterpark day; one of the highlights from the trip every time. The waterpark is only down the road from our hotel, meaning we could take advantage of the quiet couple of hours at the park when it first opened. With the park expanding, there were lots of slides and pools for the students to enjoy over the course of the day, with some of the group slides going down as the favourites. Some more daring students (and staff!) even braved the steepest slides which are not for the faint-hearted! Our evening was once again spent down at the beach, but we had an earlier night after a very busy day in the sunshine.



Sunday was spent exploring Barcelona city centre, with Mrs Shuttleworth creating a tour around some of the key sites across the city. One site was La Sagrada Familia, the famous cathedral of the city, where we witnessed the incredible architecture that has gone into the construction of the landmark. Time was also spent exploring the Gothic quarter, the 'House of Bones' and Las Ramblas, the iconic pedestrian boulevard in Barcelona, soaking up the lively atmosphere with street performers, market stalls, shops and restaurants. After a day in the sun, we headed back to the hotel to spend some time in the pool, which became a regular evening activity throughout the trip.



The next two days were spent playing football and netball. Each team spent the morning with members of Norwich FC coaching staff to work through some tactical play in readiness for the tournament in the afternoon. Our football teams faced some very talented teams, with many schools only inviting students in their football teams. However, our teamwork and community spirit shone through, and we were victorious in several leagues. Our U15 A team came first during day 1, seeing them placed in the Premiership in day 2, where they faced some extremely challenging opposition. The boys saw mixed results across day 2, but should be very proud of playing in the highest league. Our U15 B team had a tough ask, being placed into the groups with A teams on both days. What was really pleasing is how they stuck together on day 2, working exceptionally hard in the morning training to devise some better plans and tactics, which saw success during the afternoon games. Our U13s again were placed into the Premiership after being unbeaten on Day 1, but once again faced some very physical opposition, but came a respectable 3rd in their group overall. The most success from the football came from our U15 girls squad, who were victorious in their league and crowned overall winners, even after a nervy final game. Going into the final game unbeaten, the opposition had nothing to lose and caught us off guard, seeing us draw the final game. This meant the league would be on the other pitch, where a school's A and B team were playing each other. With our teachers carefully assessing goal difference in the table, the other team needed to win by more than 3 goals, but winning only 3-0 saw the league go down to head-to-head success. With our girls beating them in the opening game of the day, it was rightly ours and the celebrations began!



Miss Bates, who led the trip, was so proud of the students' attitude and engagement throughout the coaching sessions and games, learning from what the coaches had to say and then working together to get better each game. Going on a plane not only shortened the journey, but it also gave us an extra day abroad to enjoy Barcelona more than we have done in the past.



We are planning on running the trip again in 2027, and look forward to lots of students signing up in the coming weeks. We would like to note that moving forward, dance will also be an option for students on the trip, adding to the netball and football offer.

ARTSMARK SUCCESS

We are proud to share that Shuttleworth College has been awarded Artsmark Gold, a national recognition of our commitment to high-quality arts and cultural education. This award celebrates schools where the arts are embedded across the curriculum and play a key role in students' learning and development.

As highlighted in recent feedback, "what began as a drive to strengthen arts provision has grown into a sustainable, whole-school model of cross-curricular collaboration."

The arts are now part of everyday learning across multiple departments, including Drama, French, Computing, Photography, History, Art, English, SEND and Music. Students take part in activities such as "drama being performed in French," designing materials in Computing, exploring creativity in Photography, and engaging in immersive experiences in History, such as a WW1 workshop led by an actor.

Encouragingly, more students are choosing arts subjects at Key Stage 4, reflecting growing confidence and enthusiasm. Our cultural offer has also expanded to include "a varied programme of gallery visits, theatre performances, concerts and creative workshops."

Strong partnerships with organisations including Burnley Youth Theatre, Burnley College and visiting artists are providing exciting opportunities and raising awareness of careers in the creative industries.

Student leadership continues to thrive, with pupils leading clubs, organising events, and running initiatives such as the school choir, band night and displays.

This Artsmark Gold award is a fantastic achievement for our whole school community, and we look forward to building on this success in the future.

TEEN TECH FESTIVAL

A small group of Year 9 students attended the Teen Tech Festival at University of Lancashire and enjoyed a fun-filled packed day of activities. The day started at the challenge zone where students first had the opportunity to spend time with the Psychology department from the University that involved looking at and experiencing technology that is used to track brain activity and tracking of the eyes as well as participating in an activity where the students wore glasses hindering their vision (one was set to the right, one was set to the sky) and the students had to try and pass a ball to each other – this proved to be very difficult! Students went on to complete a challenge with the large company Commvault who work with cyber recovery. The students were required to work in groups to solve a cyber crime with some given information, they found this really difficult at first but with resilience and perseverance, they all managed to complete and with the correct solution. Great team work was shown by all and each and every one of them participated.



The second zone of the day was the Innovation Zone, the students worked with Ali Maggs (a digital creative and Tech Educator) developing their own ideas for future technology. All of the students worked hard on developing some amazing ideas and Bella's idea was mentioned in the top 6 ideas of the day out of all the schools and hundreds of students that attended; well done Bella! Bella's idea was for a pencil case to be made for people with colour blindness: for the user to speak into it the colour of pen/pencil needed and for the pencil case to use a mechanical grabber to take it out for the user.



The final zone of the day was the Insight zone, this zone had many companies set out stalls for students to participate in a range of activities and for them to find out more about the companies. The students experienced many different technologies including Blackpool Theatre lighting, NHS medicine, AWS, Youth Centre, police and cyber crime, Uni of Lancashire Arts & Media , UKNNL and Leyland Trucks.

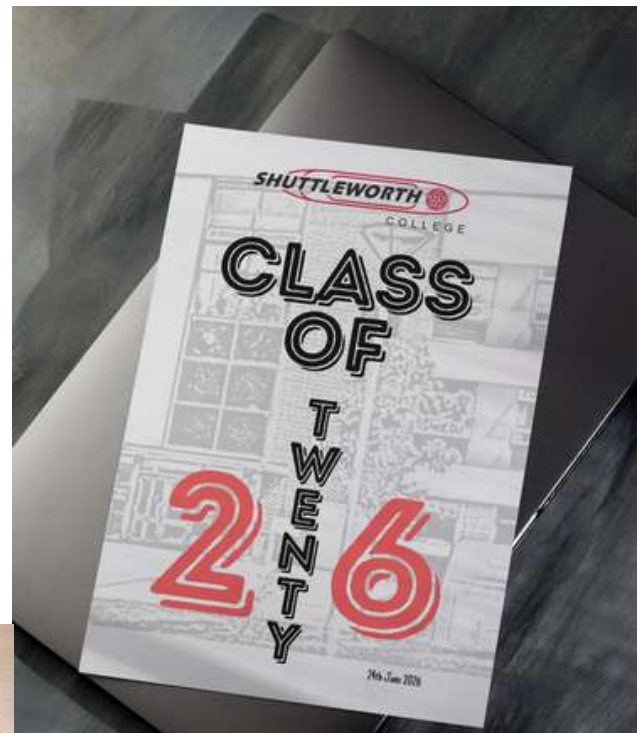

Leading the cast was Trixie Forrest, who was outstanding as the eponymous heroine. Full of confidence, determination and charm, she perfectly captured the spirit of Matilda and barely left the stage throughout the production.

The terrifying Miss Trunchbull was brought brilliantly to life by Ella Burns, who fully embraced the role and had the audience laughing and gasping in equal measure. In contrast, Hazel Lewis shone as the kind-hearted Miss Honey, bringing warmth and sincerity to every scene.



The Wormwoods provided plenty of the night's biggest laughs. April Mitchell was wonderfully over-the-top as Mrs Wormwood, while Alarna Betney threw herself into the role of Mr Wormwood with fantastic energy. Riley O'Keeffe was hilarious as Michael Wormwood, while Mia-Rose Harrison almost stole the show as Rudolpho, proving that sometimes there really is no such thing as a small role.



Among the school children, Wren Forster impressed as Lavender, while Zoey Houghton brought plenty of character to Nigel. Emily Fitzpatrick guided us through Matilda's story beautifully as Mrs Phelps, and Izabella Krupinski and Esmie Stansfield delighted audiences as the Acrobat and Escapologist.



What was particularly impressive was the number of students who doubled up on roles to help create the bustling world of Crunchem Hall. Several students stepped into parts at short notice, learned new material incredibly quickly and simply got on with it. Their enthusiasm, teamwork and willingness to support one another summed up everything that school productions should be about.

Matilda the Musical Jr. – A Joyous Celebration of Young Talent

I was delighted to be invited to watch the incredibly talented pupils from Shuttleworth College perform Matilda the Musical Jr. What followed was a thoroughly enjoyable two-hour production, packed with energy, confidence and creativity, showcasing the remarkable talents of both the performers and the many pupils working behind the scenes.

From the moment the curtain rose with “Miracle”, it was clear this was going to be a special performance. Every soloist sang with confidence and clarity, while the ensemble smiled throughout, looking genuinely thrilled to be on stage. The stunning projections, created by pupils in the Art department, added another dimension to the production and helped bring each scene vividly to life.

Leading the cast was Trixie Forrest as Matilda. Although only in Year 7, Trixie displayed a maturity far beyond her years. A gifted character actress with an excellent singing voice, she captured Matilda’s mannerisms perfectly, combining poise with just the right amount of mischievous confidence. Every time she stepped onto the stage she commanded attention, and her energetic, faultless performance of “Naughty” was undoubtedly one of the highlights of the evening.

Alarna Betney and April Mitchell made a wonderfully ridiculous Mr and Mrs Wormwood. Their costumes were perfectly over-the-top—especially Mr Wormwood’s unforgettable green hair—and both fully embraced their larger-than-life characters.

One of my favourite moments was “The Acrobat Song.” Esmie Stansfield played the Escapologist with great warmth, while Isabella Kripinski portrayed the Acrobat beautifully. The inventive addition of dynamite in Esmie’s hair was a clever touch that perfectly suited the storytelling.

Another standout number was “School Song” (the famous Alphabet Song), which highlighted not only the wonderfully creative choreography—present throughout the production thanks to Jolie Forrest—but also the cast’s impressive ability to remember such intricate staging while maintaining their character throughout.

Hazel Lewis gave a delightful performance as Miss Honey, portraying her with warmth, kindness and gentle determination. Her classroom set looked fantastic, and her heartfelt rendition of “This Little Girl” beautifully showcased her lovely singing voice.

A particular triumph of the evening was Ella Burns as the formidable Agatha Trunchbull. She strode confidently around the stage, intimidating everyone she encountered, and delivered a superb performance of “The Hammer.” Her commanding stage presence was matched by wonderfully expressive facial expressions, particularly during her scenes with Miss Honey. During “The Smell of Rebellion,” she had the audience completely convinced she had once been an Olympic hammer thrower!

Riley Okeefe's understated performance as Michael Wormwood brought plenty of laughs. His natural comic timing and strong character acting proved that sometimes less is more, particularly when portraying a character often amusing himself on stage.

The pupils' commitment never wavered. During "Chokey Chant," the genuine fear on every child's face demonstrated how completely they stayed in character from beginning to end.

The hilarious trio of Mr and Mrs Wormwood alongside Rudolpho, played by Mia-Rose Harrison, provided plenty of comic relief. Mia's wonderfully exaggerated accent and colourful costume made her scenes especially entertaining.

The lighting design by Isaac Lewis cleverly reinforced the contrasting worlds of Miss Honey and Miss Trunchbull, bathing Miss Honey in warm yellow tones while Trunchbull was accompanied by dramatic reds.

One unexpected crowd favourite was Mr Thompson's appearance as Bruce. His rumbling tummy noises and enthusiastic burping had the audience laughing throughout, yet he generously allowed his young co-stars to remain the focus whenever they shared the stage. Miss Smallman's cameo with her homemade chocolate cake—which looked delicious—was another memorable moment, while the choreography involving the school dinner trays was particularly inventive.

Emily Fitzpatrick provided excellent support as Miss Phelps, the librarian who listens patiently to Matilda's wonderful stories.

"When I Grow Up" began gently before blossoming into one of the evening's most touching musical moments. As the full company joined together, the harmonies were simply beautiful—a real credit to Musical Directors Mr Olyott and Mr Thompson.

The silence and concentration displayed during "Quiet" was equally impressive. The entire cast remained perfectly still, while Trixie demonstrated excellent vocal control, delivering the song with remarkable sensitivity.

Any lingering emotion was quickly replaced with infectious energy during "Revolution Children." The audience couldn't help but clap and sing along as the cast gave everything they had in a thrilling finale, with every solo performed confidently.

As the final bows were taken, every performer looked deservedly proud. Their smiles reflected the enormous achievement they had accomplished, and the standing ovation from many audience members confirmed just how much everyone had enjoyed the performance.

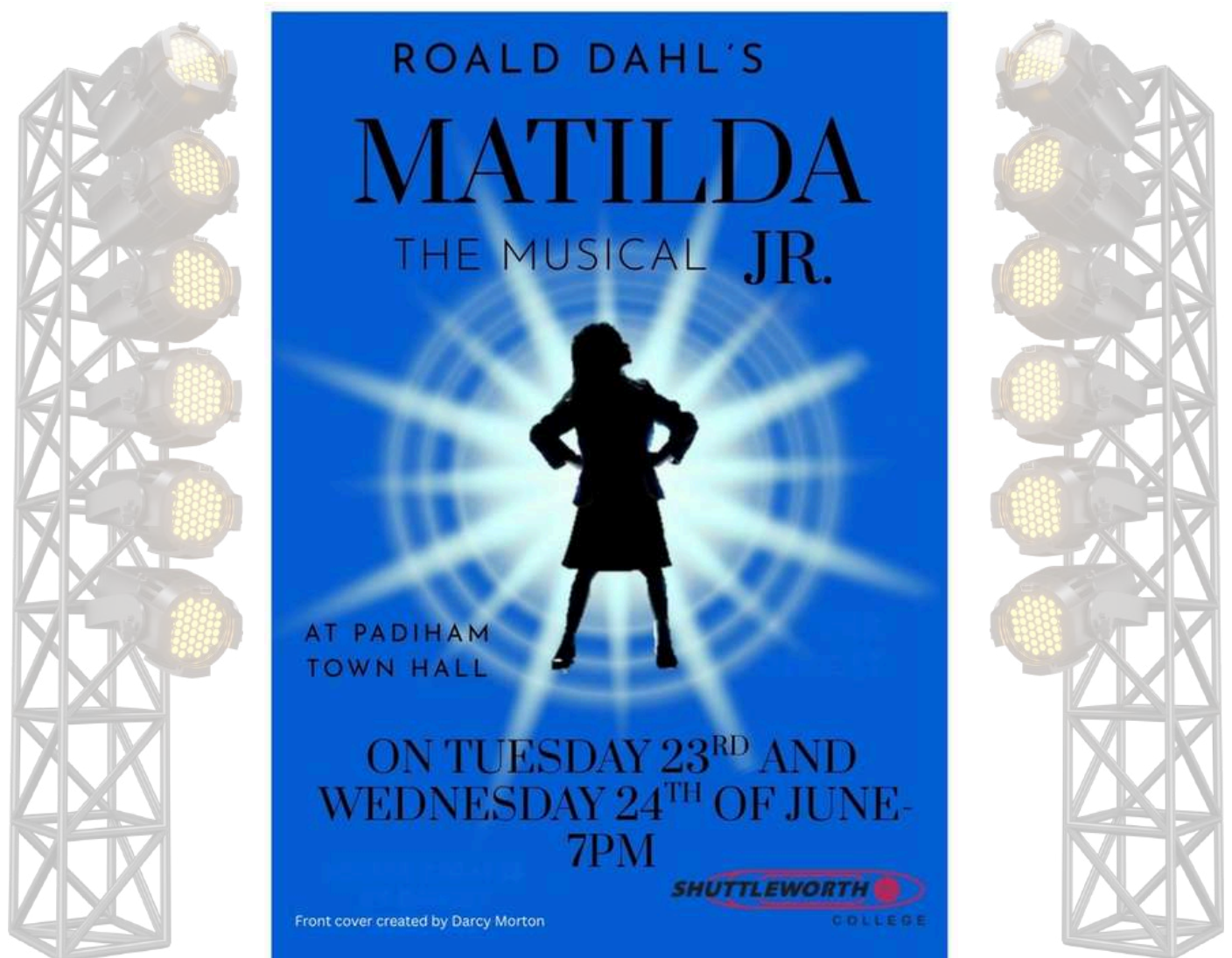

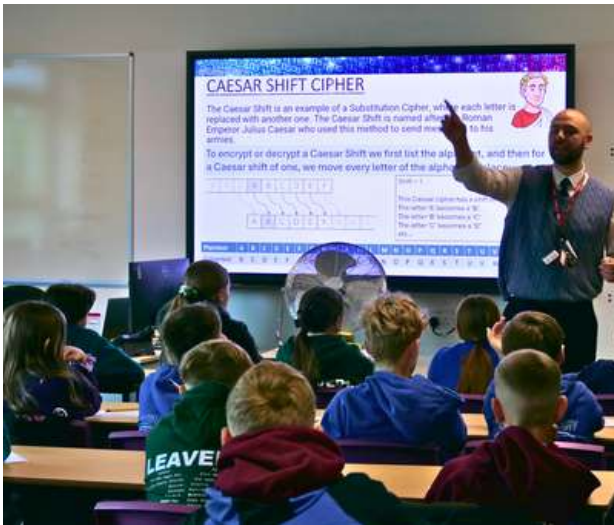
Y6s were grouped with children from other primaries and were able to meet new friends! They conducted themselves extremely well and were a credit to themselves, their families and their primary schools.

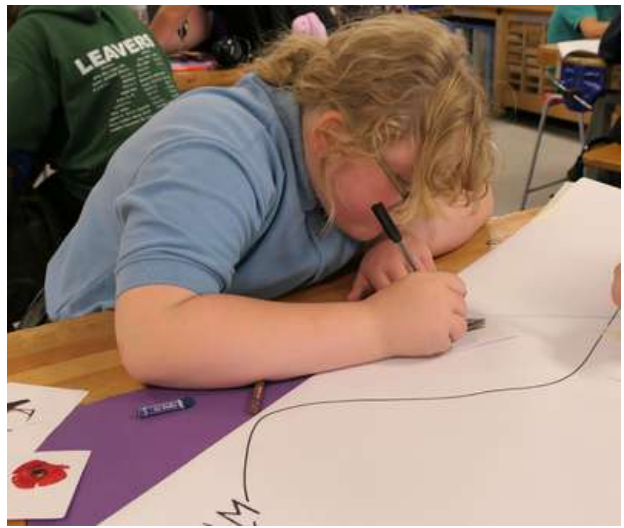


Y6 were supported by Y9 leaders who were absolutely exemplary ambassadors for Shuttleworth. We can't wait for September!

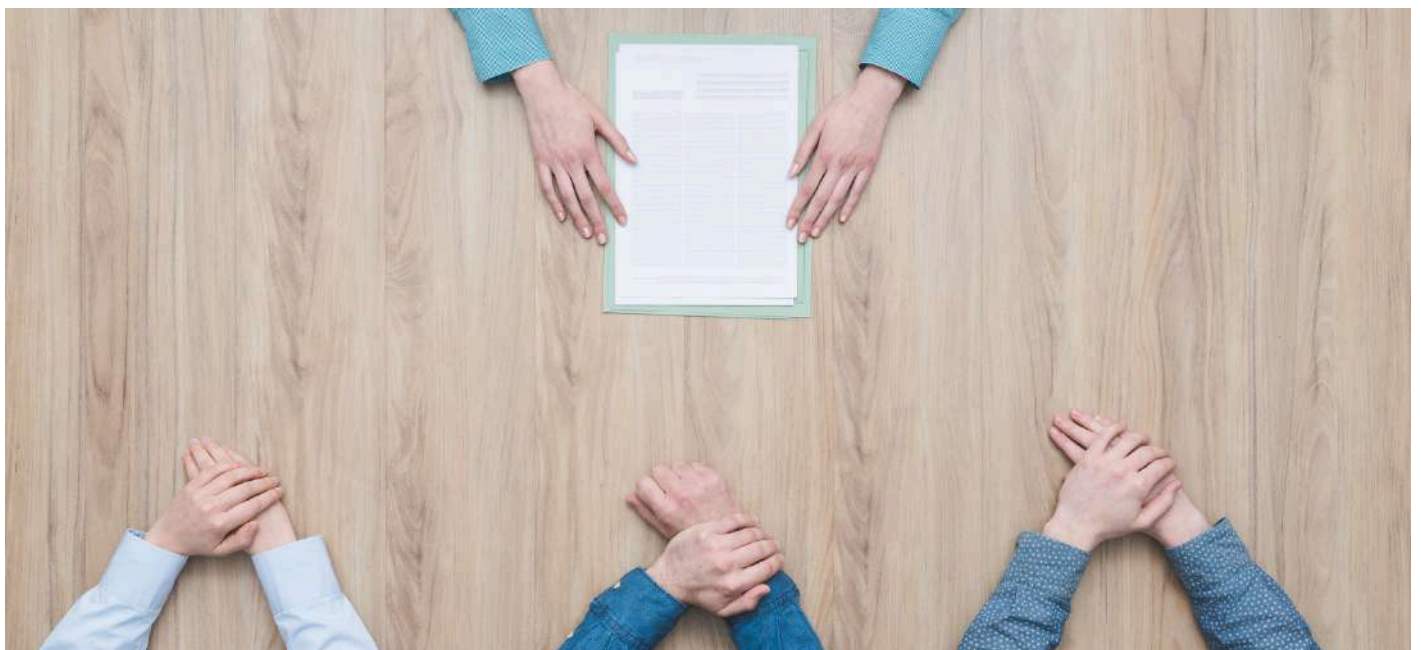

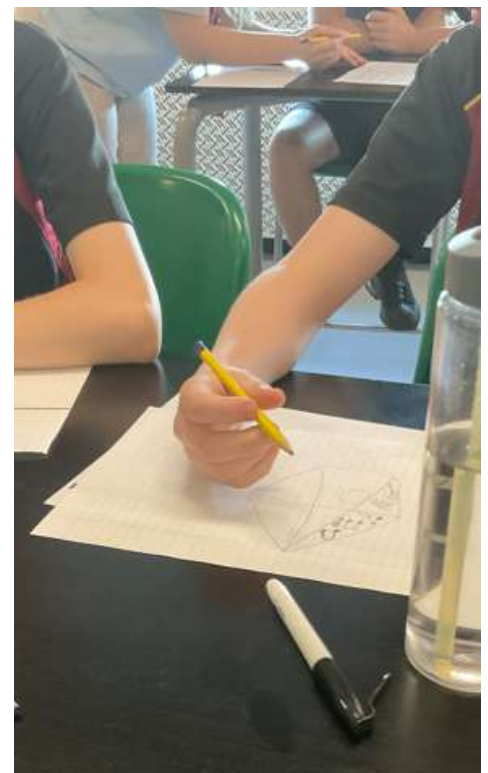
WELLBEING DAY

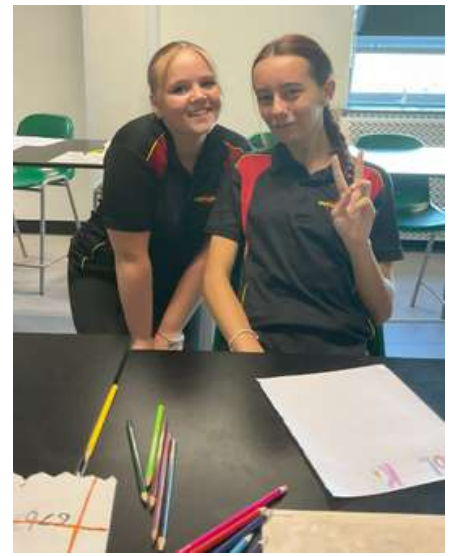
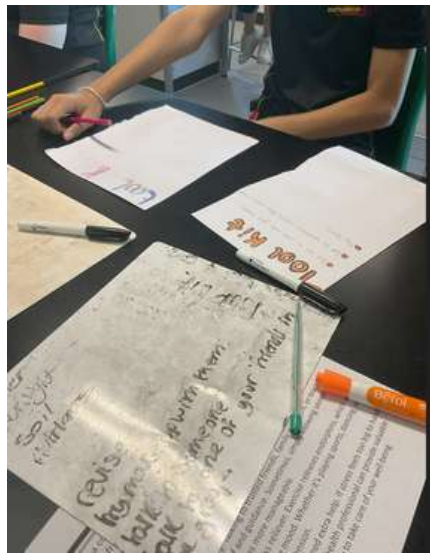

Operation Encompass is a national scheme that operates jointly between schools and all police forces.

“Children who live in homes where there is domestic abuse, or who experience domestic abuse in their own teenage relationships, can be negatively impacted by this experience.”

“Children who experience domestic abuse are recognised as victims of domestic abuse in their own right!”

“We have ensured that a member of our staff, (Designated Safeguarding Lead) known as a Key Adult, has been trained about Operation Encompass procedures. This allows us to use the information that has been confidentially shared with us by the police, to understand how a child may be impacted by domestic abuse and to then offer support to the child/ren in our care.”

“Operation Encompass means that our school will be told, prior to the start of the next school day, when police have attended an incident of domestic abuse where there is a child or young person who attends our school who is related to any of those involved in the incident.”

“This information means that we can understand a child's behaviour and support that child in whatever way they may need or want.”

“We are keen to offer the very best support possible to all our pupils and we believe that being part of Operation Encompass helps us to do this.”
