Years 8-11 joined an online assembly led by Lancashire Fire & Rescue before half term too.




## EUROPEAN WEEK OF LANGUAGES































































### A LEVEL FRENCH TASTER AT BURNLEY COLLEGE

### **BOOK FAIR**


Miss. Walsh was pleased to see students and staff browsing the books sent by the Scholastic book fair! The book fair raised over £172 to spend on brand new books for our school!








### YEAR 11 FIND YOUR FUTURE



There were also over 20 trips to different workplaces, cultural destinations and educational establishments such as Safran Nacelles, Manchester Metropolitan University and Walker Art Gallery.




We learnt the differences between all the roles, when to speak, who speaks, and much more. This very much benefitted me as it's helped given me a clear understanding about what I want to do in the future.

In July, I had the pleasure of attending an inspiring Careers Speed Networking Event hosted at Burnley Football Club, where Year 10 students from Shuttleworth High School had the chance to explore a wide range of future career paths as part of ASPIRE of their week activities. The event was brilliantly organised by Mrs with Turner groups of visited students by professionals and employers who rotated between their tables. This setup created lively, focused conversations and gave every student the opportunity to engage directly with multiple guests.







It was wonderful to see how well-prepared the students were, arriving with thoughtful questions and a genuine curiosity about the world of work. A diverse mix of employers and professionals from across the region took part, representing a variety of sectors and experiences.

I was asked all sorts of interesting questions, such as what subjects I studied at school and why, what educational pathway had I followed, what a typical day looks like in my role. There was a lot of questions about how my career has evolved from being a teacher and senior leader in a high school to my current position at the Lancashire Careers Hub, and how my work and life has along the way. These changed conversations showed iust how interested engaged and the were in understanding students different routes into work. It was a joy to see Shuttleworth students asking such insightful questions and embracing the chance to learn from professionals. Experiences like this truly help young people feel more ready and excited for the journey ahead.

During my day at the primary school, I had the opportunity to observe and support both the teachers and pupils in different activities. Overall my experience at the Walker Art Museum and Amazon were great! On the art trip once we arrived, we were told to fill in a work sheet; this would contribute later towards our artwork back in school. Most of the tasks were relatively simple, for example, we were to point out our favourite art pieces and describe what we liked about them. Doing this would help develop our own artwork and give us more points for personalisation towards our grade. Other tasks involved drawing specific features from our favourite sculptures and paintings. The art museum helped me explore different styes of art and their origins.

My time at Amazon was also fantastic - it allowed me and my friends to gain insight on things you wouldn't usually see. Who knew such a simple click of a button brought so much work? Being at the Amazon factory and seeing how they did things was fascinating and I would highly recommend it.





HycAero is a Burnley based aerospace engineering company that makes parts for military and commercial aircrafts such as the 'RAF Typhoon', a front line fighter jet, and also Airbus aircrafts that are used for commercial transport which a range of airlines own and operate to transport passengers to a variety of destinations.

# **HYC**AERO

HycAero has a full professional process to create and send off parts for their clients, the process usually starts with clients sending HycAero the design and parts that they want. HycAero usually creates a plan and then they send the design off into the workshop which then gets released to different workers. They then create parts at different stations, with the part moving around the workshop to the different stations before then being released for final checks and then being sent off to the clients.

On my visit to HycAero I was taken on a full tour around the site. I was then told about what each station does and how it works. The paint section was a quick and straightforward process as the parts were hung on a hook and then sent into the paint hub where the painter fully painted the part before the part was then released into a really hot room for quick drying. On my tour around HycAero I saw a good work ethic, and I also saw that the company prioritised health and safety for the company's employees.

HycAero is a high precision machining services for the aerospace industry creating opportunities for skilled technicians, engineers and specialists to work in specialised sector of aerospace.

During my tour around HycAero I interacted with really friendly workers who perfectly explained their role and how they got to where they are and what skills they developed and gave me a perfect insight about their role with HycAero.

HycAero benefited me with a great understanding about the company and by giving me a full view of what life is like with HycAero.

I visited Rossendale & Pendle Mountain Rescue. During the mountain rescue simulation, experiencing the stretcher first-hand gave me a real appreciation for the team's work. It highlighted the importance of trust and communication in emergency situations. This experience links directly to careers in emergency services, healthcare. and engineering, where problem-solving and teamwork are crucial. The skills we developed, such as first aid, navigation, quick decision-making, invaluable. Meeting the squad, I was impressed by their dedication and the diverse backgrounds they came from, all united by a common goal of helping others.







Recently, a small group of my year 10 classes took part in a trip to Rapid IT, a computer recycling company based in Padiham, Burnley.

The visit provided a fascinating insight into how technology can be reused and repurposed to help the environment, as a result of waste reduction.

During the trip, we had the opportunity to dismantle a laptop, which was actually more interesting than it sounds! We learnt about the different components inside and how each part can be recycled or reused. It was hands-on, a bit fiddly at times, but definitely a great way to understand the technical side of IT recycling and how much work goes into recycling technology properly.

The employees at Rapid IT were incredibly welcoming and knowledgeable. They explained the recycling process clearly, answered all of our questions and queries, demonstrating genuine enthusiasm for their work. It was clear they were passionate about what they do and their teamwork and dedication made the experience even more enjoyable and inspiring.

We also observed the importance of teamwork as we worked together to dismantle the computers safely and efficiently. This activity highlighted how collaboration and communication are essential skills in any workplace, particularly in large industries. Then, there was Dexter- the manager's puppy and the company's unofficial mascot. Dexter completely stole the show! He trotted around like he owned the place, making everyone smile and proving that even at a tech company, sometimes the most important team member has four legs and a wagging tail.

Throughout the visit, we gained a better understanding of career opportunities within the IT sector, especially those focused on sustainability and environmental responsibility. It was inspiring and fun to see how businesses like Rapid IT play a key role in reducing electronic waste, while creating valuable career paths for people with technical and problem-solving skills.

I learnt from this experience that every workplace, like Rapid IT, should condone a positive attitude as it creates motivation and joy. Plus, I agree every office should probably have a Dexter.

Overall, the trip was educational and rewarding, helping me to see the importance of teamwork and the positive impact that recycling and sustainable technology have on the world, whilst learning to create a formal perspective of myself for those around me.






### SPORTING NEWS

## STUDENT LEADERSHIP

We are passionate about students having a voice, responsibility and visibility at Shuttleworth College. We facilitate this through student voice, student council and student leadership.

Student voice takes place regularly throughout the year. We use quantitative data collection in the form of questionnaires where can ask all students key questions on safeguarding, the curriculum, enrichment, rewards and more. We also use student focus groups where we can delve deeper into students' perspectives and experiences though discussions.





This year sees an overhaul of our student council. Forms discuss key topics with the first round of student council meetings concentrating on safeguarding and student experience outside the curriculum. The following week all council representatives attend a breakfast meeting with Mrs Turner to feed back their peers' ideas. The two students in each year group who have been most proactive and prepared are invited to a full council meeting led by the Y11 student council electives and attended by key members of SLT. Relevant actions are taken and the agenda for the next round of discussions is agreed. Feedback takes place in assemblies the following week led by students.

Our newly appointed ambassadors in Year 7 will lead on transition links with primary schools and I am confident they will be exemplary role models and embody our school values in all they do.



Years 8-10 have really realised the opportunity to apply for kev ambassadors roles. I am very excited to see the work they will do academic year! We have appointed some Year 8s as reception ambassadors who will be responsible for meeting and greeting visitors, taking people on tours and supporting with key messages to ensure school runs smoothly.



They will be based in reception on a rota where they will complete their school work between reception tasks. We also have a team of eco ambassadors in Years 8-10 who have been tasked with making our school greener and more sustainable. Our more senior ambassadors in Years 9 and 10 have also been given responsibilities as enrichment ambassadors where they support students and lead staff in clubs each week and take responsibility for promoting the club through assemblies, posters in school and online and by visiting form groups. ## **OPERATION ENCOMPASS**

# Operation Encompass is a national scheme that operates jointly between schools and all police forces.

Children who live in homes where there is domestic abuse, or who experience domestic abuse in their own teenage relationships, can be negatively impacted by this experience.

We have ensured that a member of our staff, (Designated Safeguarding Lead) known as a Key Adult, has been trained about Operation Encompass procedures. This allows us to use the information that has been confidentially shared with us by the police, to understand how a child may be impacted by domestic abuse and to then offer support to the child/ren in our care.

This information means that we can understand a child's behaviour and support that child in whatever way they may need or want. Children who experience domestic abuse are recognised as victims of domestic abuse in their own right<sup>1</sup>.

Operation Encompass means that our school will be told, prior to the start of the next school day, when police have attended an incident of domestic abuse where there is a child or young person who attends our school who is related to any of those involved in the incident.

We are keen to offer the very best support possible to all our pupils and we believe that being part of Operation Encompass helps us to do this.
